

COURT PROCEEDINGS FOR OCTOBER TERM

Premium Lists Out for Northwest Grain Show

Premium lists and instructions for shipping entries for the Northwest Hay and Grain show held at Portland November 3 to 10, have been received by County Agent Morse. Twenty-five hundred dollars cash premiums will be awarded to the winners in various classes of grain and hay exhibited. Included in the premium list on wheat are the market classes and a list of wheat varieties special including 18 of the common varieties of the Northwestern grown wheat.

Any one having a good grade of wheat and wishing to send an exhibit to the show can leave a sack of it at the warehouse and notify the county agent and he will see that it is shipped, cleaned and exhibited at the show.

Between 1000 and 1500 tons of hay was sold during the past week by alfalfa farmers on the adjoining projects. The price received was from \$8 to \$8.50 per ton in the stack. Most of the purchases have been made by Ernest W. Ferguson, Inc., of Walla Walla. The hay is now being baled and shipped.

No Butter creek feeder hay has been sold, although it is reported that a deal is under way for the purchase of about 2500 tons at \$8.50—Echo News.
