New Summer Session Director at University

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 14.—(Special).—Prof. Fred L. Stetson of the school of education has been appointed director of the Eugene summer session of the University of Oregon, succeeding Colin V. Dymont who has been compelled to retire as director because of the large amount of work connected with the college of literature, arts and sciences of which he is dean.

Professor Stetson was assistant director of the Eugene session last summer. Dean Earl Kilpatrick will continue as director of the summer session at Portland. The dates for the six terms' work will be June 23 to August 1.

Professor Stetson took his bachelor's degree and master's degree at the University of Washington. He was a graduate student at Teachers College, Columbia University, where he undertook work for his doctor's degree.

Upper division and graduate work will continue to be emphasized at the summer session at Eugene, while undergraduate work will be emphasized at the Portland session. Last summer one student in four at Eugene were graduate students. Many of those enrolled were from communities outside of Oregon.

Graduate students in other cities as well as in Oregon have begun to recognize that the University offers an excellent opportunity for six weeks' intensive work in the summer. Students then may continue their vacations in the state of Oregon, which provides exceptional recreational opportunities.

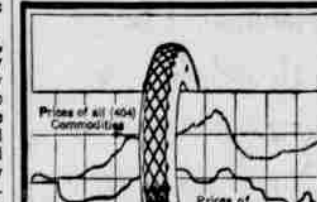

FARM POINTERS

(From O. A. C. Experiment Station.) Results from crop rotation are not very marked at first. In a rotation experiment of the Oregon Agricultural college experiment station farm which has been going for 10 years, grain continuously yielded 30 bushels of barley to the acre.

On the same soil which had a rotation that included a legume crop the yield of barley this year was 61 bushels to the acre. The following rotation is recommended by the dairy department of the O. A. C. experiment station, assuming that dairy owners have legume hay such as clover, alfalfa or oats and vetch, and corn silage. All the hay and silage the cows will clean up and a grain ration made of 300 pounds each of barley, oats and mill run, with 100 pounds of a

high protein concentrate such as linseed oil meal, cottonseed meal or coconut meal, one pound of this feed per day being allowed for each 1-2 pounds of milk produced. If kale is available it may be fed in addition to other feeds with excellent results.
