DECEMBER TERM OF COUNTY COURT

County court met in regular session at Court House in Heppner, Oregon, with all members present on Wednesday, December 5, 1923. When the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

Court approved, continued or rejected the various claims presented against the County as per notations on the face of each claim.

Court canvassed the result of the vote in Road District No. 1 for special tax levy of 5 mills and found the result to be 19 votes to none in favor of said tax.

Court canvassed the result of the vote in Road District No. 2 for special tax levy of 8 mills and found the result to be 24 votes in favor of said tax and 13 votes against.

Court ordered the balance of Bond Road Fund for the credit of Heppner-Hardman Bond Fund.

The assessor was instructed to extend on the tax roll for the coming year the Fire Patrol tax as submitted by the State Forester.

An agreement was entered into with the City of Heppner for the use of the County Jail for city prisoners for a period of one year upon payment by the city of the sum of \$1,000.
