## Small Volume Farming May Cause Low Profits

Cost Production Studies Show That Expenses Eat Up Gains When Total Business Is Light.

Many Oregon farmers who fail to make money fail because their total volume of farm business is too small, according to cost production studies conducted by the state college extension service. Gross receipts are so light that overhead and other expenses eat up all the profits.

The average annual receipts of 281 dairy farms, as determined by farm management surveys in 1920-22, totaled only \$2863. These were average size farms and the results fairly representative of that type of farming, says R. S. Besse of the extension service.

"Now from these gross receipts," Mr. Besse explains, "all cash expenses of production and operation and all interest on borrowed capital must be deducted. The balance represents the amount the farmer has left for interest on his investment and for his labor of his family."

"While these figures look a bit discouraging, there is very little about them to depress farmers. They represent averages. When all the facts are known about the individual incomes it is clear that many of the farmers were making nice profits."

"Analysis of the individual records shows that while 90 of these dairy-men had a gross income of less than \$2000 per year, 58 of them made from \$2000 to \$4000 gross income, 24 made from \$4000 to \$5000 gross income and 30 made gross incomes ranging from \$5000 to \$14,000 per year. The remainder, 67, fell into the class between \$2000 and \$3000."

"The farmers with the gross income of less than \$3000 had at best a narrow margin left for profit, after all expenses were deducted. Farmers falling under that class may well afford to adjust their operations, in order to increase net farm income."

## Has Almost Perfect Record of Attendance

Washington, March 28.—(Special.)—Of the entire number of Senators now in office the three who have shown the greatest attention to the interests of their constituents, and who have been most consistently in their seats, are Senators McNary, Capper and Shepard.

Such is the statement of Assistant Secretary Harry M. Rose of the United States Senate, who has custody of the roll calls of senators and he bases his statement on the records

of the roll calls during the terms of the senators.

So far as Senator McNary is concerned his record is almost perfect. The only time he was away from roll calls since he came to the Senate was during the time of the death and funeral of his wife some years ago, and later when he was confined to his hotel by the grippe.

Official figures tell the story of Senator McNary's devotion to Oregon and the United States. He has not missed a single roll call or been absent from his desk during all the sessions since this congress met in December.
