SENTIMENT AGAINST COUNTY UNIT.

WHILE this paper has published a few articles in support of the county unit measure that will be on the ballot at the coming primaries, these that are opposed to the system as proposed in the adoption of this law for Morrow County have been somewhat timid in coming forward with their objections. We have talked the MSU with a large number of people from over the county, however, and we find that there is quite a strong element opposed to it, and it would surprise us very much if the measure carries.

In the first place the law is thought to be entirely revolutionary in its scope, and rather than providing a help to the school system of the county, it will be the reverse. It seems to be admitted that the principles laid down are, in the main, good, but under the law as it now stands it is feared it will take too long to bring about the desired results. The net as it now appears upon the statute books is admitted by legal authorities to be faulty and should be amended in many points before being put into operation. It is really too much of an experiment.

Another objection that will stand good in Morrow County is the provision of the law covering the setting of the county and placing the elementary schools in the hands of five men. To get the five men qualified to fill this board will serve faithfully and do equal justice to all districts without pay, will be next to impossible. This feature places too much power in the hands of a few men governing the schools; then also, there is the selection of the superintendent by this board and the creation of an expensive office with its attendant high cost of maintenance. This feature will necessarily add to the tax burden—and this is no time for increase in taxes.

Why Heppner, Lexington, Ione, Boardman and Irigon, all of which towns have high schools conducted under the same roof and on the same grounds as the grade schools, would favor this bill, is hard to figure out. It opens the way to a lot of controversy and trouble as no school succeeds well under two superintendents, and this would be the case in these districts. It is argued that this point is of small force, but we have been unable to learn that such would not be the case. The law seems to work well in Crook county, but the situation there as to the high schools is different. That county has but one high school, a county high school carried on in a separate building from the grades, and the conflicting authority over school management does not arise. Klamath county is similarly affected as Morrow, and it is desired that the newly adopted unit system there is not proving satisfactory as yet.

All schools of the county should be brought under the operation of the act—high schools as well as grade schools—placing them all upon uniform basis and giving equal advantage of education to every part of the county. Then again, we doubt if the several districts of this county are ready to surrender their individuality, the school patrons in these districts do not care to have taken from them their right to say just how their schools shall be run and governed. This bill virtually deprives the communities affected of any voice in their grade schools because the so-called local "committees" are only advisory and surrender the present powers of the local boards. Other objections offered are: That districts that are out of debt or nearly so would have to pay the obligations of extravagant districts. It would be taxation without representation. It is a long step in the direction of state socialism and the confiscation of land values through vicious and unfair taxation. Far from reducing or "equalizing" taxation, it will increase taxation. The record of the three Oregon counties in which it has been tried shows a total

increase of \$125,000. It will have the effect of concentrating practically all power in conducting the elementary schools of the county in the hands of one man, the superintendent. Receiving no salary, the members of the unit board would naturally leave the power and responsibility of running the schools in the hands of the superintendent, who is the county executive and their adviser. This is a summary of the various objections being urged against the passage of the measure in this county. There are many others, but as this paper sides up the proposition, we believe that the school system of the county should be allowed to go along undisturbed by any change such as are proposed by the county unit, and let those other counties who have already adopted the plan, work it out and prove to us whether or not it is a good thing. Let them pay the bill for the experiments; we have plenty of time to wait.

STAY WITH HOME MAN.

THE fact that Morrow County is ranked on to Umatilla as a part of the twenty-second representative district makes it hard for us to ever have any direct representation in the legislature at Salem. Not every election are we fortunate enough to get a man to consent to run from this county that is of proper calibre to rightly represent us, and when we do, loyalty to our own interests, and to the home man should prompt the rolling up of a practically unanimous vote for him.

This is one of the years when it is possible to get the right man to consent to make the race in the primaries. W. B. Barratt of Heppner is in the race and we doubt very much if a better man could have been secured. Mr. Barratt met with no opposition here and his candidacy was largely endorsed by leading citizens of Umatilla county, who were prompted to assure him that he would have no opponent on the ticket from that part of the district. Mr. Barratt had no particular desire to enter into a hard fought battle for the place, feeling that he was not justified in doing so, but upon receiving the assurance that he did from Umatilla people, he allowed his name to be presented on the ballot, feeling that he could depend upon loyal support from his own home county.

Through his more than forty years of residence in this district we feel that Mr. Barratt is as well versed in the particular needs of Morrow County as any man that could have been named to get into the race. At this particular time he is so situated as to give time and attention to any legislative affairs that would be for our benefit and his general knowledge of conditions over the entire district of eastern Oregon makes him a valuable man. His experience on the state highway commission also peculiarly fits Mr. Barratt for the legislative position. Numerous important changes will be presented before the coming session of the legislature affecting the highway program and Mr. Barratt will be in position to render good service here, as he well understands what will be necessary to make the future of the state's highway system what it should be.

The good work Mr. Barratt did for his home county when on the highway commission—a service that was well appreciated, should entitle him to the same support of the republicans of the county. Let us stay with the Morrow county man and secure at least a little direct representation; a joint representative is all we do get and we should not be the ward of the Umatilla county dog.

COMMUNITY LOYALTY.

HAVE you ever stopped to consider the fact that loyalty to community interests is the highest form of patriotism? Show us the man who is loyal and true to every interest of his own community and we will show you in that same individual man in whom his country can repose absolute confidence in any emergency that calls for his allegiance.

On the other hand, the man who is careless and unconcerned for the interests of his community is most apt to display the same spirit of indifference toward his government or his state should any serious danger threaten either.

Try to imagine an entire state composed of innumerable communities welded and cemented into a symmetrical whole, each striving to excel the others, but each, from its own local loyalty, developing a broader and deeper loyalty that reaches out to the entire community whole.

This would be brought about if we could be brought to see that we owe allegiance to our own people, but that the prosperity and success of others is in no wise a detriment to

us, but rather a help, that if each community would develop loyalty to the utmost—materially, mentally and morally—none would need be envious of others, neither would any need arise to detract from another's interest. Let us develop community loyalty to the full—the highest possible form of patriotism.—Madras Pioneer.
