

COUNTY COURT MET FOR MAY SESSION

Court met by regular session on Wednesday, June 4, 1924, at Heppner, Oregon, with all officers present, when among others the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

Mr. Frank Markham was appointed a viewer to act with the regular viewers in viewing and laying out the proposed road as petitioned for by W. R. Walpole and others and June 11th set as the date for making said survey.

Mailing A Watch
