"The Making of an American,"  
Subject of Brilliant Address.

He came to this country when a small lad to escape Turkish persecution and became assimilated



with American ideas and ideals. He has devoted the intervening years to educating himself and teaching the naturalized citizen the difference between mere citizenship and Americanism. This 100% American has addressed hundreds of audiences. He speaks perfect English, is a college graduate, a deep thinker and a fearless advocate of American ideals.

**Reforestation Bill Is  
Signed by President**

President Coolidge signed on June 7, the Clarke-McNary reforestation bill, the first act ever passed providing for a forestry policy for the nation. The new act lays the foundation for a sound system of forestry and forest protection in this country. This is the measure for which efforts have been made steadily for five years by federal, state and private foresters, by forest protective associations, by lumbermen, timber owners and business men of the United States.

The act is a recognition that the federal government, states and the private timber owners each have an interest and a responsibility not only in the protection but the perpetuation of the forests of the nation and that each should bear its share of the cost, forest officers state.

The fact that there are 81 million acres of denuded and idle forest lands in this country, that 10 million acres are being cut over each year, that about 30,000 forest fires occur annually sweeping over 7 million acres, that we are cutting and let burn up our forests five times faster than we are growing them, are some of the things that make the Reforestation Act of 1924 of vital importance, forest officers say.

Important features of the act are listed by forest officers as follows: provision for cooperation in fire protection by government, state and private owner of timbered and forest-producing lands; a nation-wide study of forest taxation; provides for forest planting on cooperative basis between the government and states; for farm forests, such as farmers' woodlots, windbreaks, etc.; extends the provisions of the Weeks Law of March 1, 1911, allowing the purchase by the Government of lands suitable for timber production throughout the United States; provides a way for donation to the federal government of forest lands; the creation of forests from public domain after approval by the National Forest Reservation Commission and Congress; and the making of national forests of parts of military and naval reservations upon agreement of the secretaries concerned. The act authorizes the annual expenditure of \$2,700,000 to carry out the provisions of the act but carries no appropriation for the first fiscal year.

**Veterans Need Not Ask  
About Bonus Particulars**

It is not necessary to write to the War Department, the Navy Department, or the United States Veterans Bureau, for blank forms of application for adjusted compensation, or for any information concerning it. Full information with regard thereto will be published in the public press and detailed information will be contained in the circular that will accompany each application. When the blank forms of application and the circulars have been printed, they will be immediately distributed throughout the country to the post offices, to the posts of the American Legion and other veteran organizations, to the American Red Cross chapters, and to the Army and Navy recruiting offices, and Army and Navy posts and stations, for immediate delivery to all persons who desire to apply for the adjusted compensation. It is expected that copies of application and circulars of instructions will be available for distribution on or before June 30, 1924.

Cash payment of the adjusted compensation to those entitled to \$50 or less will not be made prior to March 1, 1925. The adjusted service certificates will bear date January 1, 1925 or later, but, under the law, no loan can be made on the adjusted certificates until two years after the date of such certificates.

The War Department, Navy Department and the United States Veterans' Bureau have made extensive preparations to handle promptly all claims for the adjusted compensation. This great work will require the undivided attention of every employee, and it will be impossible to answer individual inquiries concerning the matter. Such inquiries would not only be useless, but to answer them would delay action on the claims. Claimants will aid materially if they will fill up the blank forms of application to the best of their ability in accordance with their own knowledge or recollection of the facts, and refrain from writing to the War Department, Navy Department, or the United States Veterans' Bureau, concerning adjusted compensation.

**FARM POINTERS**

Red spiders, which are likely to strike at almost any plant in Oregon from low-growing annuals to tall trees, develop most rapidly and become most harmful in dry weather. The best protection so far reported by the Oregon experiment station is dusting with sulphur. Most sulphur containing insecticides are effective if applied thoroughly, and some growers use liquid sulphur solutions.

Anthrax disease of geeseberries is indicated by the presence of

many small dark spots on the leaves that often cause the leaves to drop. Bordeaux applied in 4-50 strength thoroughly to both surfaces of the leaves is the remedy found effective by the Oregon experiment station. Directions for making and using the spray may be had on application to the agricultural college at Corvallis.

Barley waist high in good stand and good condition is now growing on the experiment station grounds at Corvallis. Many of the crops at the station were never better, even though the season has been trying by unusual drought. The main factors in the station crop condition are rotation and thorough preparation of seed bed.

**BAD SEASON FOR FIRES.**

One hundred and twenty-four forest fires have been reported on the 22 National Forests of Oregon and Washington since March 1, 1924, according to District Forester Geo. H. Cecil. There were 57 in the last ten days of May. The Forest Service has already had to put on some 65 emergency fire guards. This is a most unusual situation.

From all indications the forest officials are fearful of a bad forest fire season. Mr. Cecil further states that smoking has been prohibited on certain areas of the Forest where the fire hazard is high. If a real emergency arises he will be justified in closing all roads into the National Forests and keeping out all campers to reduce the danger of a general conflagration. The general rains of the past couple of weeks, however, have reduced the danger somewhat and the season may not prove as dry in the forests as the early conditions indicated.

From forest records, based on fifteen years figures, forest fires are caused (in order of number) by: campers, smokers, railroads, lumbering, brush burning, incendiary—the first two are by far the highest factors. Over 70 per cent are due to man—25 to 30 per cent to lightning. Visitors to the National Forests are rapidly increasing each year as new roads, trails and camping places are opening up, and it stands everyone in hand to exercise the greatest of

caution. All visitors to the National Forests are required to have permits from the local forest supervisor to build fires, and those contemplating camping in the mountains this season should get their permits from the nearest supervisor.

A good box, 4 or 5 inches square, should be used. The watch wrapped and firmly packed to prevent bumping against the sides. Cotton should not be used under any conditions.  
A larger box costs but 2 or 3 cents extra for postage and usually saves breakage in transit. Insurance on the average watch is 3 to 5 cents and protects one against loss entirely.
