SEE MORROW COUNTY FIRST. SUMMERTIME in America sees practically the entire nation on wheels rolling its way to spots of scenic beauty and diversion of the big outdoors. Everyone has the craze.

Morrow county people have become imbued with it and every day of the vacation season finds some of her citizens cracking up the Jimmy to go some place—mostly some enticing trip, either highly advertised, or of which their friends have told them, taking them outside Morrow county. Many of these people are not acquainted with the scenery within the confines of their own domain, so to speak. They do not know that many of the same kind of views they travel many miles to see, can be seen by comparatively short ride to the mountains in the south end of Morrow county.

Our attention was this week called to the fact that the roads in our own Blue mountains are now in very good condition, and that in a day's drive from Heppner a car can carry one over a long loop-road surrounded by unsurpassed mountain scenery. No part of the Blue mountains is more blessed with Nature's wonders than that belt which crosses the south end of our county. The forests are thickly wooded with large pine, fir and tamarack trees overhanging an abundant growth of wild grass and shrubs. Many crystal, ice-cold brooks run in the ravines, and large grass-covered prairies bordered on all sides by beautiful timber offer alluring places. Many of the peaks are high, from which may be seen other mountain ranges in the distance with open country intervening, giving a delightful view as well as an idea of the topography of the country neighboring our home. From a spot on the road on the east side of the next mountain beyond Arbutus, where a new grade is being built, with the aid of field glasses one can see the city of Pendleton in the distance and cars rolling down Emigrant hill on the Old Oregon Trail.

Now that hunting season is at hand it is indeed advisable for our citizens to take these mountains under consideration, for besides the scenic attractions they offer, they also abound with deer and game birds. Let Morrow county citizens make their motto, when traveling, "see Morrow county first."
