

Local Happenings

Getting out a day early last week, the following interesting item concerning Bethel Missionary society arrived too late to get in the paper: Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 25th, Mrs. Frank Anderson, assisted by Mrs. Casson and Mrs. Barton, entertained in her home Bethel Ladies Missionary society. After Thanksgiving roll call responses, including bits from two radio Thanksgiving sermons heard Sunday night, Mrs. George Thomson spoke on China's relation to the other nations, from the viewpoint held by China herself.
