Taraughout the country, one hum. dred thousand people are enjoying the Christmas season, who would have perished if the disease were as uncontrolled as it was a decade and

a half ago.

In Oregon, the toll in tuberculosis deaths in 1928 was 528, and the best estimates indicate that about 5000 people in the state are afflicted. To-berculosis is now churasterised by berrulesis is now characterised by leading specialists as a preventable curable disease, and one that need not menace the lives of our citizens, if known measures of prevention and proper living are put into practice. The chief object of the Christmas Seal sale is to finance the educational

campaign which will help equip the general public with such information about the maintenance of their health, that tuberculosis shall be ultimately eliminated as a destroyer of mankind.
