The seal, with its bold, victorious figure, typifies the movement which it has financed so successfully that within the last fourteen years the death rate from tuberculosis has been cut in half in the United States.

In Oregon, the toll in tuberculosis deaths in 1923 was 623, and the best estimates indicate that about 6000 people in the state are afflicted. Tuberculosis is now characterized by leading specialists as a preventable curable disease and one that need not menace the lives of our citizens, if known measures of prevention and proper living are put into practice.

University Completes A Successful Football Year

University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 2.—Despite the 6 to 0 defeat administered to Oregon by the Multnomah Athletic Club on Thanksgiving Day, the University completed a successful football year. The season's play demonstrated Coach Joe Maddock's ability to take in hand a new eleven, train the men in a new system of play, and then make an extraordinary showing.

The alumni, students, and other backers of the Oregon team must be entirely satisfied with the showing made by the team, which defeated both the University of Washington, one of its strongest teams in the Pacific Coast conference and the Oregon Agricultural College. Both games were won by scores of 7 to 3. In each contest, Oregon played brainy football and at crucial moments the line held like the Rock of Gibraltar.

Coach Maddock, who learned his football at Michigan under Yost and who turned out championship teams at the University of Utah for five years, lived up to his advance reputation as a winner. Oregon should have a splendid season in 1925. With the exception of Capt. Dick Reed, this year's varsity will be intact next year. This first team material, together with this season's freshmen who will be eligible for the varsity next year, should give Maddock a lot to work with next fall.

Although the student council has not checked up finally to ascertain the number who won varsity emblems this fall, as far as is known 14 men won the football "O." Captain Reed receives his third award as an Oregon athlete. Shields, Bailey, Wilson, Mautz, Bliss, Terjeson and Anderson receive their second awards. Jones, Vilus, Kerns, Smith, C. Johnson and Mimsigh get their first varsity letter.

Too Much Heat Cause of Many Common Colds

State Board of Health. One of the most important predisposing factors to acute respiratory diseases is breathing hot, vitiated and dusty air. More people suffer from common colds than any other single ailment. The sum total of the inconveniences, complications and economic loss resulting from common colds class these infections among the serious diseases. The prevention of colds consists, first, in avoiding people who have colds, and second, in guarding against the predisposing causes.

Avoid too much heat. Acclimatize yourself to healthful temperatures. If you would have red cheeks and clear eyes, sleep out of doors. The universal demand of the present day in human beings is efficiency. Anything that will increase efficiency is to be welcomed.

In general, cool moving air of a moderate, low humidity, is more conducive to efficiency than a hot, humid still air. Experts on ventilation have discovered that sixty-eight degrees Fahrenheit gives the best results in working efficiency and personal comfort. A thermometer is absolutely necessary for determining correct temperatures. Fresh air is essential for building and maintaining good health. Abundance of air should be assured by open window ventilation. A well designed window board will prevent drafts. Children who spend the entire day in a poorly ventilated school room are not given a fair chance for proper development. Good ventilation is a big factor in the war on respiratory diseases. The good effects of open air life no longer demands proof. In disease as well

as in health the effect is a general one on the body and not merely a question of breathing air. In this sense the open air is an air bath even when the body is clothed.
