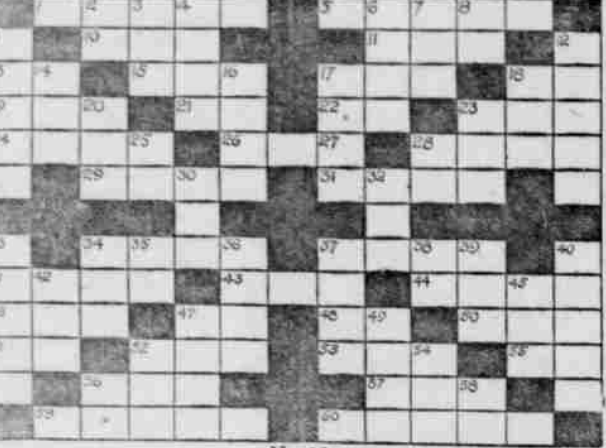

**HOW TO SOLVE A CROSS-WORD PUZZLE**

The first letter of each word is indicated by a number placed in the black white squares, and by referring to the list of words given below, you will find the definition. For instance, number one indicates the definition of a word which will fill in all the white spaces in the first black space on the right. Number one vertical gives the definition for a word which will fill in all the white spaces in the first black space on the top. The black spaces indicate the end of a word, and no letters to follow in them. When completed, the puzzle must read both horizontally and vertically across and down.

**Why Not a Lincoln Chart?**

NOT even the recent eclipse with all its thrills and wonders fires the imagination in the American boy as does the magic name of Lincoln. The mysteries of nature may appal us all, but it is the human touch that stimulates to action all latent qualities of the soul. To the American lad Lincoln embodies the greatest combination of characteristics ever found within the breast of single man. He emphasizes the spirit of human tenderness, of undaunted courage, of firmness and rigidity of purpose, and perhaps above all the spirit of tolerance and human understanding. Little if anything may be said of Lincoln that has not commanded the expression of the world's great minds. All humanity pays tribute at his shrine.

It is recorded that when he was walking to the national capital one day he said the great regret of his life was that he had been denied the advantage of a college education. What an inspiration in those words for the youth of today showered as he is with educational opportunities. We wonder if the boys and girls in this town have learned a real lesson from the life or from this thought of Lincoln, or do they think of him only in the terms of his immortal Gettysburg address. What a wonderful thing if we used the legacy he has left us, if each of us took measure of the man, considered the characteristics that made him great and then by close self-examination found out in what proportion those characteristics rested in ourselves. Perhaps we might sense love of humanity as the dominant note, and then strive to measure somewhat to the standard. We might make a little chart and examine it from month to month to see how our percentages are getting along, giving 100 to Lincoln as the standard of a real American. It might prove more interesting than even the crossword puzzle and really give a meaning to hundred per cent Americanism.

THE proposal to add another cent or so to the gasoline tax in Oregon by the present legislature, is only following out the policy that was started in this state when, in 1919, that commodity was made to bear a tax of 1 cent. Oregon started something at this time, and at each succeeding session of the legislature this tax has been increased until at this present session it is proposed to make it six cents. California and a number of other western states will have followed the lead of Oregon. In the natural course of events it would seem that the increase in the use of motor vehicles and consumption of gasoline would be about sufficient to care for the upkeep of the highways, and there would appear to be no excuse for making one particular product or class of citizens bear

continually rising burden of taxation. The raise in the tax rate on gasoline is being strongly opposed by the motor association of Oregon.

**BRONZE tablet, memorial** to Samuel K. Barlow, has been placed at Government Camp on the Oregon Trail by the Sons and Daughters of the Pioneers. Mr. Barlow, in 1846, built and opened a road over the Cascade Mountains, on the south side of Mount Hood. The dedication services for this tablet will be held in conjunction with those for the new Mt. Hood Loop Highway, some time in the late summer, under the auspices of the Sons and Daughters of the Pioneers. The land upon which the marker has been placed will soon be deeded to the state. Members of the committee in charge are: Mr. Harvey Starkweather, chairman; Mrs. D. P. Thompson, Mrs. Mary Barlow, ex-officio; Mr. Leslie Scott, Mrs. W. B. Crane, Mr. George H. Himes.

**Reducing the Public Debt.** DURING the last four years the public debt of our country has been reduced some \$3,198,000,000, and the annual interest charge on the government has been reduced from \$99,000,000 to \$86,500,000.
