PENDLETON East Oregonian. THE following news story from the Oregon Journal offers

Schnectady, N. V., March 15.—(Uni-ed News)—A 200,000,000 volt testing outfit, capable of furnishing the highest voltage ever produced at commer-cial frequency, has been ordered by the Leland Stanford university from

the General Electric company.

The equipment will be used for research work in anticipation of the day when power for the vicinity around Palo Alto, Cal., where the university is located, will have to be transmitted 400 to 700 miles from the

transmitted 490 to 700 miles from the Columbia river basin. This will require voltages much in excess of those now used, or new methods of transmission.

There are experts, however, who tell us that we need not look afar for markets for Columbia river power. The power could all be used in the northwest if sold upon used in the northwest if sold upon a low price basis and our region would be the beneficiary by such a policy. The states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho should work together upon this subject. We need a hydro electric policy that will insure development and also the largest possible use of power in the territory where it is generated.
