WHEAT FARMERS MAY MAKE THEIR DUSTING MACHINE

O. A. C. Bulletin Describes Home Made Inexpensive Copper Carbonate Treating Machine.

Oregon wheat growers may make their own machine for dusting seed wheat with copper carbonate for smut, by sending to G. A. C. for extension bulletin 381. Dusting has proved much better than the wet method under Oregon conditions, and the dust needs to be put on more thoroughly than can be done by shoveling over the dust and grain. the dust needs to be put on more thoroughly than can be done by shoveling over the dust and grain.
