Sam A. Kozer

It is a real pleasure in these peculiar times to see a candidate for public office whose claim thereto is justly based upon qualification and service. Such a one is Sam A. Kozer, the present secretary of state, who is asking the nomination at the hands of the Republican voters to succeed himself.

There is no man in Oregon so familiar with the business affairs of the state as Mr. Kozer is and no man better fitted by natural and acquired accomplishment to conduct them in the interest of the taxpayers. He was brought to the Secretary of State's office in 1899 by Frank L. Dunbar because of his qualifications and reliability as an accountant, and it was during the eight years of Dunbar's service that the first scientific system of bookkeeping and accounting in that department was established, in the installation of which Mr. Kozer was a leading actor. He later served in other business departments of the state and was again taken into the Secretary of State's office as chief deputy under Mr. Olcott, who appointed him Secretary of State when Mr. Olcott became Governor in 1919. Mr. Kozer was elected to the office in 1920 and is therefore up for a second term.

The Secretary of State's office is a very big business institution and needs a trained mind to handle it. It requires not only competency in business knowledge, but absolute honesty, integrity and courage. It calls for the kind of man who can say no when it is necessary, and one whose pledges and promises can be relied on, personally, politically and commercially—a man who will not pledge impossible things for votes without being able, or even hoping to accomplish any of them, but who will squarely do his best and constantly keep in mind the principles of honest economy with an eye single to the progress and prosperity of the state.

That is the kind of man Sam Kozer is, and it is a pleasure to this paper to be able to recommend him without reserve to the voters of this part of Oregon.

If it were only known, no doubt an investigation of the prohibition bureau would disclose colossal extravagances of the taxpayers money in high salaries and useless waste. The wise man of the Oregonian probably has a like opinion but keeps mum.
