Ione Takes Opening League

Game From Heppner 8 to 3

A large delegation of Ione boosters followed the Ione boys to Heppner Sunday where they took the long end of the score by outplaying the county seat team.

Heppner scored 1 run in the first thru a hit by Conley, after two men were out, followed by wide throw to first base. The only other time they came near scoring was in the 8th when they earned two runs thru a 3-bagger by Paul Aiken, followed by a hit by Roberts. Spec Aiken wen out and then King made a hit which allowed Heppner their 3rd count.

Ione made 3 scores in the 3rd thru a hit by Lewis which was followed by two strikeouts, then Eubanks and Werner each knocked out a 2-bagger, a single by Cochran and 3 runs crossed.

The fifth found Vic Rietmann and Thornton poking the ball for singles and Eubank's second two bagger brought in 2 more tallies.

A walk, two wild throws and an error gave Ione one run in the 6th. Three hits coupled with several errors counted 2 more in the 9th.

Eubank was the main hitter, having made three hits. Thornton pitched a good game and made two hits which he converted into runs. Arch Cochran put a chill into Heppner fans by making a couple of good catches in the early part of the game and Dutch Rietman slamed one to the center field which gave Anderson a chance to show his ability.

Heppner management put a much needed rule into effect when they cleared the field of spectators and the rule will be followed by other managers.

King evidently lost his head by being struck out twice and then was thrown out after laying down a bunt and thought he was wearing boxing gloves, but was very promptly quieted.

Bert Johnson of Ione, umpired and had an unusual number of very close decisions to make and the game was carried out without a hitch. He will umpire for Heppner and Ione all season.

County Unit Law Opposed

Pendleton, Or., April 15 — A recommendation that the proposal to adopt the county unit school law of Oregon in Umatilla county, which will be voted on in the May primary election, should be voted down was made by the X-club in an open letter published yesterday. The communication says the club favors the principle of the law but is opposed to centralization of authority. Members of the club are ex-public officials.

Oregon Receives More Money Than Neighbor States

Salem, Ore., (Special)—With "tax reduction, farm relief, law enforcement and Oregon development" as his campaign slogan, U. S. Senator Charles L. McNary last Friday filed with the secretary of state his declaration of candidacy for renomination in the May republican primaries.

Senator McNary is completing his seventh year in the senate, and during his term of office has accomplished more for Oregon than any other senator in its history. In fact U. S. senator George H. Moses, republican leader in the senate from New Hampshire, declares that Senator McNary "has accomplished more during his tenure in office than any western senator."



Since Senator McNary entered the senate Oregon has received appropriations from the government totaling the giant sum of \$30,789,819.

It has received \$9,255,762 for its rivers and harbors, which is \$6,506,228 more than Washington received, and \$59,617 more than California received during the corresponding period.

It has received \$9,808,000 for its reclamation and power projects, which when reduced to an irrigable area basis is approximately \$47 per acre for Oregon, which is \$25 per acre more than Idaho received, \$19 per acre more than Washington received, and \$14 per acre more than California received.

It received \$11,138,107 for its public roads, forest roads and trails, which is \$1,691,251 more than Washington received, and \$1,350,992 more than Idaho received.

In addition, Oregon received during the seven years Senator McNary has been in the senate, an appropriation of \$507,900 for agricultural relief, \$50,000 for an aeroplane service for forest protection and \$30,000 for the extermination of pine beetle.

Within the last few days Senator McNary also has been successful in passing in the senate his bill appropriating \$30,000 for a forest experiment station to be located in Oregon.

During his term in office Senator McNary has done more for the agricultural, horticultural and livestock interests than any man in the senate. As a leader in the tariff bloc he secured a protective tariff on farm products including eggs, prunes, walnuts, filberts, maraschine cherries, cream, butter, butter substitutes, cheese, cheese substitutes and other commodities. He secured appropriations for experts to make a study of the walnut, pear, apple and broccoli and cranberry industries, appropriations for frost stations and broadcasting of market reports. He secured an amendment to the war finance act authorizing the advancement of funds to the farmers and livestock men so that they could carry their
