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### Don't Be the "Other Fellow." About 15,700 lives were lost in

motor vehicle accidents (exclusive of grade crossing collisions between motor vehicles and trains) in the United States during 1923, an increase of nearly 2,000 over the 1922 record. Grade crossing fatalities make a total exceeding 17,000.

This estimate was made by the National Safety Committee of the Automobile Department of the National Bureau of Casualty and Surety Underwriters on the basis of statistics of 135 cities.

It may be all right to insure your car against fire, theft, collision, public liability and property damage, and so long as the secident which may be due to your carelessness merely hurts the "other fellow" you let the insurance company worry about the cost. But if you happen to ne the "other fellow," insurance collected by your heirs may not help you in the place to which you wish to go.
