DRY TREATMENT BEST

Wheat smut has yielded to control by copper carbonate dust, according to investigations by the experiment station. The cost, the labor and the risk are less than for treatment with liquid bluestone or formaldehyde. Fewer seeds are damaged by the chemicals and hence one-fourth less seed is ample for a good stand. The plants germinate better under unfavorable conditions of drouth and emerge much stronger and more vigorous. Dept. Industrial Journalism, O. A. C.

Donated Land to Be Accepted

The acceptance of donations, by the government, of privately owned land suitable for forest growing, is one of the important provisions of the recently enacted Clarke-McNary Bill, according to C. J. 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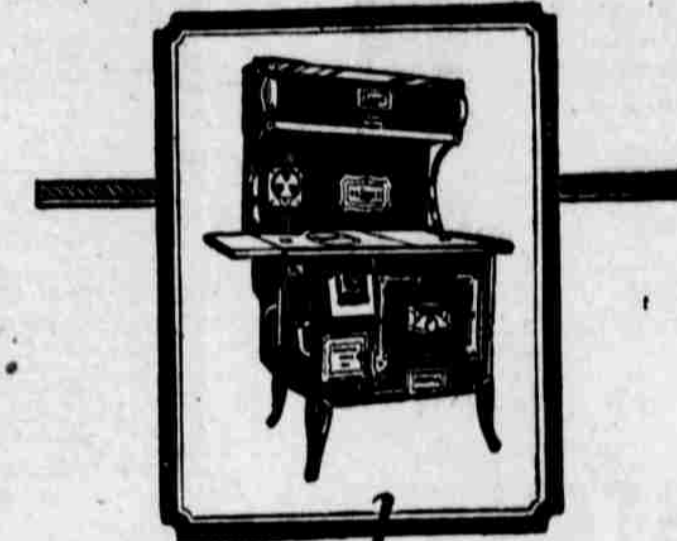
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
