Last Sunday evening while seated at the supper table, Mr. Eugene Myers suffered a partial stroke of paralysis induced by a cerebral hemorrhage.

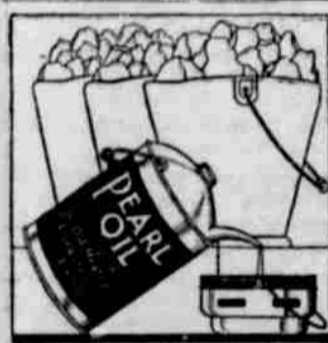
