COOLIDGE IN THE LEAD IN OREGON

McNary Is Re-elected United States Senator By a Large Majority.

Portland, Or.—Calvin Coolidge carried Oregon by an unprecedented plurality. In the counties outside of Multnomah it is estimated that that part of the state will give him conservatively from 50,000 to 60,000 plurality, while Multnomah county alone will give him a plurality around 30,000 as a probable minimum.

In Oregon as a whole second place in the presidential voting is as yet somewhat in doubt. In Multnomah county, where resides one-third of the vote, La Follette electors are running comfortably ahead of the Davis electors.

Charles L. McNary has defeated Milton A. Miller for the United States senate by a great majority, and Oregon will send to the lower house of congress a solid republican delegation. W. C. Hawley in the first district, N. J. Sinnott in the second and M. E. Crumpacker in the first have all been elected by large majorities.

The republican candidates for secretary of state and attorney-general, Sam A. Koser and L. H. Van Winkle, both have big leads over their democratic opponents.

Oregon voters erased the state income tax law from the statute books, it is indicated by the returns.

At the same time the state electorate, by decisive action, apparently turned down the referendum proposal to make unlawful the manufacture and sale of oleomargarine and butter substitutes.

The proposed amendment to the workmen's compensation act likewise was "snowed under" at the polls.

CALIFORNIA FOR COOLIDGE

La Follette Is Second and Davis Is a Poor Third.

San Francisco.—The only question that remained to be settled in California Tuesday night was the extent of the majority for Calvin Coolidge.

A tabulation based on incomplete reports from 51 of the 58 counties gave Coolidge 309,397, La Follette 149,635, Davis 29,552, Farris 5188.

Senator La Follette appeared to have carried only 11 counties, although seven other smaller counties had not been heard from when the foregoing figures were tabulated.

Los Angeles.—President Coolidge will carry Los Angeles county by between 175,000 and 200,000 votes, it was asserted here by William W. Kerr, acting registrar of voters.

Davis Congratulates Coolidge.

Washington, D. C.—John W. Davis Wednesday congratulated President Coolidge on his election to the presidency. "Permit me to congratulate you," Mr. Davis telegraphed, "on your sweeping victory and to express the hope that your administration may by its success insure to the welfare of the country." President Coolidge sent this reply: "Please accept my thanks for your message and my appreciation of the patriotic sentiments you express."

Brookhart May Be Defeated in Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia.—The defeat of Senator Smith W. Brookhart, to whom most of Iowa's political leaders had, before the election, conceded a comparatively easy victory, appeared on the face of unofficial returns to have been accomplished by Daniel F. Steck, an Ottumwa lawyer.
