Annual O. S. T. A. Meeting

Eugene, Ore. (Special)—Three educational leaders of national reputation will appear on the program of the Oregon State Teacher's Association, at the annual meeting in Portland, on December 29 30 31. They are: Mrs. Olive M. Jones of the elementary schools of New York, president of the National Educational Association for the year 1923 24; President Thomas W. Butcher of the Kansas state teachers college, Emporia, Kansas, and Miss Mabel Carney, specialist in rural education at Teachers College, Columbia University.

There will be no general program on Monday, December 29, at the opening day is always given over to the deliberations of the representative council. Reports of standing committees will be heard, and all business of the association will be transacted on that day. Only the duly elected delegates may take part in the discussions of the council, but the sessions are public and all teachers are cordially invited to be present. The general sessions when the visiting educators will speak, will be held on Tuesday morning, December 30th, and Wednesday afternoon, December 31st. Departmental meetings will occur Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday morning.

Departments of the association which will have special programs are: rural schools, boys' and girls' club work, Oregon State council of English, higher education, class room teachers, librarians, city superintendents, school principals, Oregon state council of geography teachers, history, modern languages science and mathematics, art, music, physical training, physical education, vocational education, agriculture, commerce, home economics, industrial art.

All sessions will be held in the Lincoln High School building, Portland. The Portland Hotel will be the official headquarters of the association. Reports from sectional chairman indicate that every county in Oregon will have a good representation and that the attendance at the convention will be not less than 2,500.—E. F. Carleton, T. of O., Press Representative, O. S. T. A.
