Washington, D. C.,—Balthasar H. Meyer of Wisconsin and J. B. Campbell of Spokane, Wash., were reappointed by President Coolidge as members of the interstate commerce commission.

Coolidge for Reclamation Work.
Although he has lived all his life in a country where reclamation is somewhat meaningless, President Coolidge is responsive to the needs of the west, as shown in his letter to the convention of the American Mining Congress at Sacramento recently. He said water power and irrigation go hand in hand and continued, "It is my purpose to unremittingly stimulate and encourage the development of these great projects by every authority of the federal government."

Real Economies Made.
The number of federal employees has been reduced more than 100,000 in the past three years. Government financing has been put on a sound basis, with expenses cut to a minimum and deficits turned into surpluses. It is these sensible economies that have brought about reductions in federal taxes.

Changes in Oregon School Laws Urged
Portland, Or.—The 1925 legislature will be called to pass upon eight questions involving changes in the present school laws, including the long-discussed free textbook proposal, teachers' retirement fund and a request for new normal school facilities, as the result of resolutions adopted by the Oregon State Teachers' association at the opening session of the annual convention here.
