

GIFTS TO UNIVERSITY

The University of Oregon gift campaign headquarters is in receipt of \$1013 in cash from the Kennell-Ellis Portrait Studio of Eugene, the latest donation to the building and development fund of the state institution.

A second gift to be received by the University was from Luella Clay Carson, former professor of English and dean of women at the University. She gave eighty-five books, largely in the field of English literature, to the library.

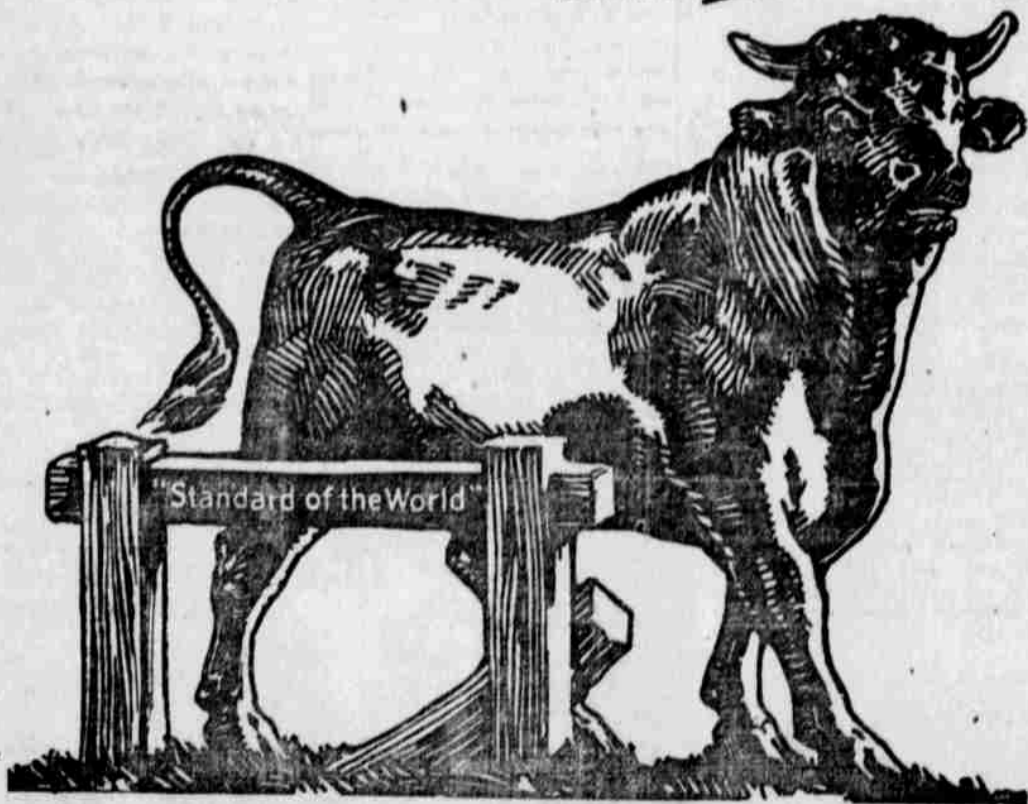
