Besides having the ideal cow as well as feed for the teams sold the Willow creek portion of his ranch and built a home one-half mile up Rhea creek. He was married in 1872 to Missouria Haney, daughter of John Haney. who settled at The Pines in 1870, and continued in the cattle business until cattle went down to \$10,00 per head when he sold out. In 1882 they went to Alkali, now Arlington, where they built a for ten years. Then the desire for better schools took them to Faculty members Monmouth where they again operated a boarding house and prepared to educate their child-The death of their son reaching Monmouth caused them to change their plans and they returned to the ranch in 1895 Mr. Jordan was of the progressive pioneer spirit and was the first man to intrduce a McCormick cutting machine on the creek and when he returned to the farm he set out the only hop yard that was ever planted in these parts. Heps went down to 7 cents per pound and after harvesting two crops the yard was plowed up and sown to alfalfa. He engaged in raising hay and stock until his death in 1901 when he was placed beside his three, children in Lexington Cemetery.

> Mrs. Jordan operated the farm for several years and then came to lone, where she has conducted a hospital and is one of the few survivors of Pioneer Days. Mrs. V. M. Ray of Junction City and Lute Jordan of Los Angeles are HEPPNER TAILORING CO.
