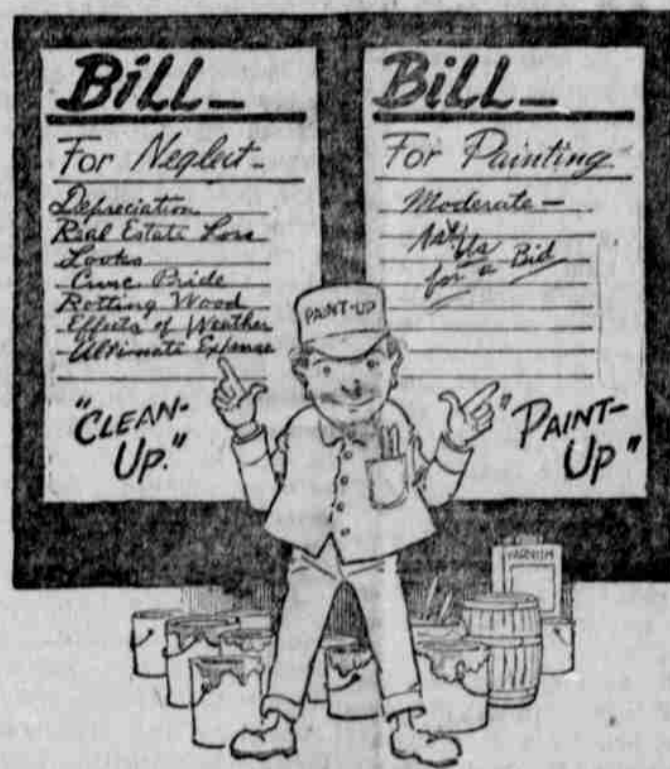

CONVENTION OF SCHOOL BOARDS MEETS

Convention Addressed By S. E. Notson and State Sup't Churchill

The annual convention of school district officers met in Heppner on the fourteenth inst. and was attended by a large number of the school officers and teachers of Morrow county.

The opening address of the morning session was made by Hon. S. E. Notson, District Attorney, who spoke on the importance of the school board in the school system. Mr. Notson emphasized the point that the school board determines the policy of the district and is the controlling factor in the local school system.

Their responsibilities are many said Mr. Notson but the duty of selecting teachers is the greatest. Building, equipment, libraries and play grounds are important and do not constitute more than 15 or 20 per cent of the value of a school leaving at least 80 per cent of the value of the school to be supplied by the teaching force.

Sup't. Churchill addressed the convention at the morning session on the problems of District Management.

He made an appeal for better schools and emphasized the personal, equipment library and sanitation

He spoke of the increase in the requirements for teachers and stated that to provide for the instruction and training of teachers additional facilities had been provided by the state.

He said that ten years from now that the requirements for teachers will include 4 years in a teachers college.
