

E. Notson and State Sup't Churchill

The annual convention of Heppner on the fourteenth ins't. and was attended by a large number of the school officers and teachers of Morrow county.

The opening address of the morning session was made by Hon. S. E. Notson, District Attorney, who spoke on the importance of the school board in the school system. Mr. Notson emphasized the point that the school board determines the policy of the district and is the controling factor in the local school system.
