One hundred and forty-nine
 years have passed since the rep-
 resentatives of thirteen colonies
 until that time under the

tutelage of Great Britain sol-
 emnly declared that the Colon-
 ies were and of right ought to
 be free and independent states

and, to the achievement of that
 independence pledged their lives
 their fortunes and their sacre-
 honor.

One hundred and forty-nine
 years have seen thirteen feeble
 colonies develop into a nation

composed of forty-eight states,
 then confined to the Atlantic
 seaboard, now the nation forms
 an imperial dominion on which
 the sun never sets.

We Americans are justly
 proud of the record of the one
 hundred and forty-nine years
 that have passed since the 4th

day of July, 1776. We show

 Although Oregon has 100,000
 colonies of bees 10,000 beekeepers
 and \$1,500,000 invested in bees
 and beekeeping equipment, many
 carloads of honey are imported
 into the state annually. The state
 is capable of supplying enough
 honey to meet the demands of
 immediate consumption and still
 have enough remaining to sup-
 pliant all of the syrup and much
 of the sugar now used in the
 state.

GAME ON NATIONAL FOREST

Over 687,000 head of big game
 animals make their home on
 Uncle Sam's 159 National Forest
 this is the estimate for 1924,
 made by the forest rangers of
 the U. S. Forest service. Of course
 there may be 687,051—the rangers
 didn't count them, but these
 are out in the hills and their esti-
 mate is a little better than any-
 one else's.

Compared with the previous
 year, the U. S. figures show an
 increase of about 44,000 head
 after due allowance is made for
 44,326 head of bear which were
 not included in the estimates of
 former years but which are in-
 cluded in the 1924 estimates.
