CROP OBSERVER

MORSE AND PECK APPOINTED FOR MORROW CO. BY SEARS ROEBUCK.

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The appointment of R. W. Morse of Heppner and G. N. Peck of Lexington, as crop observers in Morrow county for the Sears-Roebuck Agricultural Foundation, is announced from Chicago by P. V. Ewing, director of research for the Foundation and editor of the Index. They will form a link in the nation wide chain of county agricultural observers elected because of their first hand knowledge of farming conditions and their ability to observe and intelligently interpret them.

The Index to which the observers from this country will contribute is a compilation of the monthly reports of the 3,650 observers in every section of the country and this number is being added no sleazily. All the observers are practical, thinking, farm minded men, each chosen because of the opportunities he has to observe the needs of agriculture in his own locality and for his ability to apply economic principles to current farm problems. As a group they represent a cross section of the thoughts that the man in the furrow is thinking, and their joint analysis of existing agricultural conditions, as expressed in the Index, is considered a forward step in helping agriculture help itself.
