New Lamps Will Give

Better Light and the
 Prices Will be Less

An important step in standard-
 ization, by which the leading
 manufacturers of the incandes-
 cent lamp hope to achieve for
 themselves and the public econ-
 omies hitherto impossible, has
 been taken by the General Elec-
 tric and Westinghouse Compa-
 nies. A new standard Mazda bulb
 for ordinary use has been adopt-
 ed and production to provide a
 lamp the use of which is intended
 to be universal through the grad-
 ual elimination of the many types
 of these lights now on the mar-
 ket.

The home owner is to be the im-
 mediate beneficiary of the new
 policy. He will be able to procure
 lights of greater utility at less
 cost than is now entailed. How-
 ever, since many commercial es-
 tablishments and office buildings
 use small watt lamps, they will
 be correspondingly benefited.

Instead of forty-five stand-
 ard lamps of the present or old
 design there to be only five. The
 first of the five has been placed
 on the market at prices 10 to 13
 cents below the cost of the old
 ones.

Sends an Envoy to Europe to Study Tailors' Guilds

EDGAR R. BORN, head of the Born Tailors' Guild, recently established in
 Chicago to lift the tailoring trade to a higher plane of perfection and
 place it in the class of a profession, announced today that he had sent a
 special commissioner to Europe to study the organization
 and accomplishments of the English Guilds, after which
 the Chicago association of master tailors is being modeled.
 Mr. Born's representative is traveling incognito. He ex-
 pects to spend several months in gathering the data which
 will be used in furthering the purposes of the American
 Guild, the first of its kind in the United States. Among
 the places the commissioner will visit in quest of facts
 are Reading, Worcester, London, Exeter, Beverly in Eng-
 land and Edinburgh, Scotland.

"We want our master tailors to reassert their pride
 in perfection in workmanship and to study men's dress as
 a profession," said Mr. Born in announcing that he had
 dispatched a representative to Europe on a tour of in-
 vestigation. "This should mean better dressed men and
 more economy throughout the industry."
