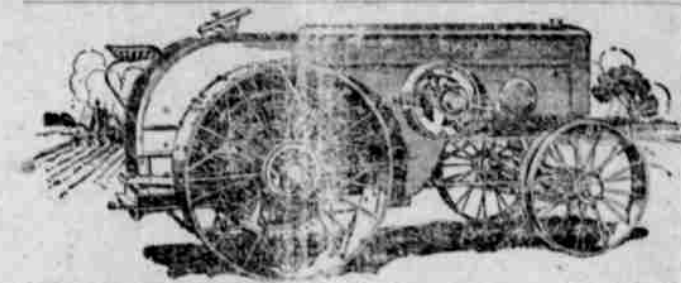

 isn't that way today. The baggy old trousers and sweater are about as much  
 out of date as mother's old pongee duster and long-flowing motor veil she  
 wore in 1905.  
 The keynotes for the up-to-date sports outfit are comfort, durability and  
 a certain air of careless elegance. The so-called golf suit is  
 the ideal outfit for almost all sports. It consists of knickerbockers  
 and loose-fitting coats with inverted plaits at the back to permit  
 an easy swing of club or racket. Tweeds are the most  
 popular materials with flannels and homespuns not far behind.  
 One very practical suit is a four-piece, consisting of coat,
