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FORMER IONE RESIDENT DIES AT WALLA WALLA ONCE IONE CITY OFFICIAL

Milton, Oregon, October 28.
—Loren Ernest Coyle, for 15 years a resident of Milton, died Monday at the Walla Walla hospital. He was 54 years old at the time of his death. He was born at Lebanon, Oregon, Sept. 24, 1871. Both his parents were born at the same place. Besides his widow, three daughters, Edna and Norma of New York City and Oda of Milton survive. The funeral will be held from the funeral home at 10 o'clock Saturday.

WASHINGTON PIONEER PASSES AT IONE

Charles Marion Beck was born August 31, 1822 at Shelbyville, Shelby Co. Ill. and died at Ione Oregon, Oct. 24, 1925, being 73 years 1 month and 23 days old. He was married in Linn Co. Kansas to Etta Johnson, who survives him. Of this union were born six children, Chester A. Lula Jane deceased, Lelia Myrtle, Paul deceased, Charles Oscar, and Alma Burnette. He also leaves 18 grandchildren, two great grandchildren and three sisters Mrs. John Wier, Mrs. J. B. Horton and Mrs. Henry Ellis of Ione, as well as many nieces and nephews and a host of friends to mourn his loss.

He came to Cleveland in 1883 and engaged in farming for several years later engaging in the business until the late 1890s. He then moved with the family to Ione in 1907.

UNEARNED CRITICISM

There has been some disposition to criticize the administration of the country's banking system for the sudden collapse of prices and curtailment of credits in 1920 and 1921, and the subsequent financial difficulties of the farmers. As a matter of fact, whatever blame may be attached to bankers must be for the too generous financing, in many cases, of speculative investment in farm property during the period of inflation. If any just criticism could be directed at the manner in which the Federal Reserve System functioned in this situation in the opinion of many it would be that the Reserve banks delayed too long in raising the rediscount rates. An earlier effort might have stayed the process of inflation.

The collapse of 1920 was by no means confined to agriculture, and was the inevitable sequel to the inflation period. All branches of business suffered in this period of reaction and perhaps none more than banking, against which this criticism has been leveled. The financial situation of the farmers was greatly aggravated by the fact that the high land values and high prices of agricultural products had led many farmers to incur obligations
