ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RED CROSS

To Red Cross Workers.

A few answers to question in leaflet. Financed one year alone the Red Cross County Nurse.

The following year alone had help from the county of \$1000.00 We paid the balance for a year and a half. We were responsible for many corrections of Eye Ear and teeth trouble by calling attention of parents to them. We assisted in and financed the removals of about ten tonsil and adenoid cases, served four children under the Crippled Childrens act. We looked after and investigated about twenty delinquent cases, children as well as parent, three tubercular cases in Lexington; gave money to two destitute families, paid for lunches furnished the men who volunteered their time and labor from Heppner to help clean up the streets of Lexington this summer after their flood. Helped hospitalize an ex service man, assisted family before and after death in lone, served and furnished nurse in sickness near lone; two families destitute in Hardman, clothes, blankets, shoes and provisions. Heppner served two destitute families, aided eight families after our recent fire this summer Surely we have much to be thankful to the Red Cross.

These are just a few of the local assistance rendered. Also we have furnished two dozen glasses to the ex veterans in hospitals. Two bed or bath robes, and will furnish when finished twelve sweaters, Chapter furnishing yarn, and twenty four beanies or sleeping caps, and fifty silencers for slaming door and are going to furnish a Loan Closet with Layfette made by the girls in school and various orders.

I could keep on telling you fine things for quite a while. First aid instruction, life saving, home hygiene, nursing, and nutrition. Thank you for your kind attention, assistance and wishing you success, I am yours for service, Mrs. Emmet Cochran
