## VACANCY TO BE FILLED AT MILITARY ACADEMY CONGRESSMAN SINNOTT ANNOUNCES PLACE AND DATE

Washington, D. C. Dec. 18 '25 Congressman N. J. Sinnott has announced that he will fill an emergency vacancy for the Second Oregon District in the U. S. Military Academy at West Point by means of a district wide competitive examination.

The examination, which will be conducted for the congressman by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, will be held Jan. 9, 1926 at 9 o'clock a. m., at the post office building in every city in the district where the Commission can conduct the same, to-wit Pendleton, La Grande, Baker, The Dalles, Kinzath Falls, Ontario, Lakeview, Hood River, Enterprise, Prineville, Bend. Appointees must be bona-fide residents of the second district of the Second Congressional District not under 17 years of age nor over 22 years of age on the date of admission to the Academy (July 1, 1926), and not less than 5 feet 4 inches in height.

Time allowed for the examination is 6 1/2 hours on the following subjects: Algebra, Plane Geometry, English composition and Literature; United States History, General History and English Grammar.
