#### Tree of Vast Age

A tree trunk of record size, that grew in the coal-making forests millions of years ago, has been discovered by Prof. Sarl Noc. paleobotanist of the University of Chicago. The find was made in a coal hed of the Carbondale formation, near West Frankfort, III. The circumference of the ancient trunk is ten feet, and the length of the section, uncarthed about five. The whole tree, as it originally grew, may have been in the neighborhood of 100 feet high, Doctor Noe says. The surface of the trunk is covered with close-set pits, which are the scales where the leaves once grew. These ancient trees had few branches, and the leaves grew all over the trunk, I as the scales of a fish. The name of the genus, "Lepidodendron," means "scale tree."


The City Marshall presented a list of delinquent light and water patrons and was instructen to proceed to collect delinquent sccounts or discontinue the service.
