STANFIELD ANNOUNCES THE CANDIDACY OF Mc NARY

According to an announcement made by Senator Robert N. Stanfield of Oregon, there is a concerted movement on foot in Senatorial circles in Washington for the purpose of including then ame of Senator Charles L. McNary, also of Oregon, as a Republican candidate for Vice President in 1928. His name was brought to the attention of prominent members of the Upper House by Senator Stanfield after there had been much comment concerning the boom for Nicholas Longworth, present Speaker of the House of Representatives, for presidential honors.

Senator Stanfield, in making his formal announcement, said, "For some time rumors have persistently been circulated in Washington to the effect that a quiet movement was on foot for the purpose of nominating Speaker Nicholas Longworth of the House for the presidency in 1928. I am reminded that, in 1924, the Republican nomination was tendered to four individuals before it was finally accepted by Charles G. Dawes. I have been intimately associated with my colleague, Senator McNary, for many years and have seen much of his ability. I therefore feel constrained to submit his name to a group of Republican leaders as a possible candidate for the vice presidency.
