Exception is made for legal notices and recognized direction signs for tourists, while signs will not be permitted on fences, trees, or en buildings belonging to the county. Fines provided range from \$25 to \$200 or imprisonment for not more than 50 days, or both, for violations

The usual circuit, start ing at the grid, runs from the grid socket terminal to the secondary of the audio-frequency, transfermer; the other terminal of the transformer sec ondary to the correct terminal of the 'C' battery, while the positive of the "C" buttery goes to the negative "A" battery lead.

The UV 109 tube used in the first stage of amplification should have a 415 volt negative bias, but does not work with a 2214 volt bias. Three cells give the required 4% volta Securing 416 Voits for First Stage.

The novice may be confused by the merkings on the battery when he is directed to connect the grid return of the first amplifier tube with the +18 terminal of the "C" buttery in order to obtain 41/2 volts negative As compared with +22%, however, 18 volts is 45 volts less or negative. Consequently, to secure a grid blas of 414 voits, we connect the grid return to the 18 volt tap of the 22% volt battery. The 21 volt tap is 114 volts negative, as compared with +221/2; the 101/2 volt tap, 3 volta negative, and the 18 volt tap, 43/4 volts negative. If you now have no "C" buttery in the first stage, simply disregard this part of the process.

The grid return from the secondary of the second stage transformer is connected with the negative terminal of the 22% volt battery. This gives 2214 volts negative bias, the amount required by the UX 120. The method of identifying this terminal has already been described in connection with the instructions for installing the 41/4 volt "C" buttery for the UX 112.

Interesting Facts You Should Know About Set

A five per cent overload of filmment voltage may cut the life of your tubes in half.

Operating tubes at five per cent below rated filament voltage may double the life of your tubes. Cutting your plate voltage from

90 to 67% saves two milliamperes of "B" battery current per tube, usually without sacrifice of volume or quality, and this step in some cases may double the life of your "B" batteries?

A "C" battery used with a two-stage audio-frequency amplifier having 90 volts plate potential, cuts its current drain from twelve to four milliamperes, a saving of two-thirds, Not more than forty-five volts

should be used on your detector tube to secure the greatest volume and the best quality of reproduction? The use of 50 volts instead of 45 volts trebles the current con-

simption of your detector tube with out improving results in any way.

A superheterodyne drawing 50 milliamperes gives no better results

than a well designed one drawing but 15 milliamperes. If the vacuum tube does not light

it may be caused by many other defects besides a burnt-out tube. The "A" battery switch or connections may be open, dirty contacts of the rheostat, socket or tube tips, or the tube may not be seated properly in the socket.
