IONE DEFEATS ARLINGTON

Arlington Puts Up Hard Fight

Ione defeated Arlington in a closely contested game, Sunday, by a score of 5 to 4. Arlington got the start on Ione in the first inning while they put the local boys in the field with three balls each resulting in an out. The next inning dealt scores to neither side. In Ione's half of the third inning Dutch Reitman singled and while the next batter struck out, stole second. Werner came to bat and singled while Dutch went third. Dutch stole home and then the batter made the third out. The next inning saw two men out before A. Cochran gained the third sack. Bristow who was on first started to second and was caught in a hot box. After Cochran had scored Bristow was tagged out. As this was the third out there was some doubt as to whether or not the score should count but on referring to page 58, rule 59 in the "Official Base Ball Rules" we find Umpire in Chief Ferris was correct in rendering his decision in favor of the home team. The fifth inning netted the Iones two runs. Arlington made another counter in the seventh and when Ione came to bat Hoskins dropped one into the cellar for a home run. Arlington stacked up one more run in the game ended with a score of 5 to 4 in favor of the Ione nine.

Werner Reitman, the outstanding star of the game, played a wonderful game in the field and bingled out four hits at four trips to the plate.

In the first half of the eighth inning the locals, receiver, Hoskins, was forced to withdraw from the game on account of an injury to his hand. Lundell took Bristow's place at second base while the latter relieved the catcher.

Ione plays Hermiston on the 30th. at Hermiston and on the following Sunday the Hermiston nine will play here.

The Echo and Umatilla teams have decided to start their game at Umatilla at 1:00 P. M. so that their fans may attend the game at Hermiston.
