M., the 1st day of June, 1926, and immediately thereafter the bids received will be publicly opened by the County Court, at the County Court Room in the Courthouse in Heppner, Oregon, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of Morrow County for the construction of permanent roads therein in the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000), said bonds to be in denominations of \$1,000 each, numbered 1 to 120 inclusive, to bear date of June 1, 1926, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$6,000 on the first day of June in each of the years 1932 to 1951 inclusive, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of June and December, principal and interest payable in gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer in Heppner, Oregon, or at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City. All bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified check for \$5,000.00.
