Plowman Badly Hurt

Mr. Tyndal Robinson of Eight Mile was severely injured on Tuesday when hitching up his horses to plow after dinner. An outlaw horse suddenly struck him down and mauled him terrifically. Before he could help himself the ran away and dragged a three bottom plow over his body.

With the assistance of the hired man, Robinson got up and walked to the house, about a half mile away. Mrs Robinson was horror stricken and phoned immediately for Dr. McMurdo who rushed out to meet him and accompanied him to the office where he was X-rayed and his many wounds bruises and broken bones fixed up.

He was then taken to the Heppner Surgical Hospital where he was placed under the care of two special nurses.

The X-ray picture showed his left shoulder blade split in two from top to bottom; three ribs broken on the same side and his left shoulder blade broken at the top. His right ankle is badly sprained and the skin and flesh is badly cut and bruised from his head to his feet. Although his condition is very serious he is getting along as well as could be expected at this time.

Laws Against Profanity
