## CITY HALL BRIEFS

### City Streets to Be Improved.

#### Masons Get Permit To Move Building

At a special meeting of the Council of the City of Ione, held on Monday evening, two matters of business were considered and disposed of.

Roll call showed the Mayor and all councilmen except Walter Smith present.

In the matter of the petition of the Masonic Lodge to move their newly acquired building from its present location onto the lot on delonging to the lodge. The permit was granted by unanimous vote.

The project of improving Main, Spring, Green and H streets was taken up and after due consideration, it was unanimously voted to authorize the expenditure of not to exceed \$1,500 in the improvement of the above named streets.

The newly installed pump for the water system is a vast improvement over the old one and bids fair to pay for itself in a short time by the reduction in the amount of electric current used.

Twenty-five more meters are being installed on the service lines of the city water system. This makes a total of 75 installed out of 100 ordered.

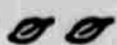
