## OPERATOR RISKS LIFE TO ASSIST IN RESCUE

Braves Winter Blasts on Way  
to Central Office Where  
She Aids Coast Guard.

Risking her life in order to  
be at her post to call help, Miss  
Catherine Brown of Scituate,  
Massachusetts, telephone opera-  
tor, walked two and a half miles  
during a recent storm to the ex-  
change at Sand Hills. With the  
elements raging and with fallen  
wires that meaded here every step,  
the girl continued on her way to  
the exchange in order that she  
might be able to call help and as-  
sist in the rescue by coast guards  
men of a crew of eight men from  
the schooner Kenwood.

The schooner had been wrecked  
in the storm and when Miss  
Brown noticed the signal rocket  
sent up by the beleaguered sailors  
she hurried to the telephone ex-  
change, where she remained all  
night, working by candle light  
and put through unaided the var-  
ious calls. The lighting system of  
the exchange had been put out of  
commission by the storm, but,  
after locating a candle, she took  
up her post at the board, where  
she maintained her long and lone  
some night without food and with-  
out relief until the danger had  
been overcome.

### VICTORIA and the TELEPHONE

After dinner we went into the  
council room and saw the tele-  
phone. Dr. Bell explained the  
whole process, which is most ex-  
traordinary. We talked with Sir  
Thomas and also heard singing  
quite plainly.
