M., the 7th day of July, 1926, and immediately thereafter the bids will be publicly opened by the County Court, at the County Court Room in the Court House in Heppner, Oregon, for the purchase of an issue of bonds of Morrow County for the construction of permanent roads therein in the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000), said bonds to be in denominations of \$1,000 each, numbered 1 to 120 inclusive, to bear date of June 1, 1926, and to mature serially in numerical order at the rate of \$5,000 on the first day of June in each of the years 1932 to 1951 inclusive, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of June and December, principal and interest payable in gold coin at the office of the County Treasurer in Heppner, Oregon, or at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City.

All bids must be unconditional and accompanied by a certified check for \$5,000.00.

I was about ten years old when the war ended in '65, but some of the men did not quit fighting for several years afterward. The James and Younger boys were among those that kept up their warfare.

Missouri was a poverty stricken country at the end of the war, though a rich country if it had had proceers instead of zomany consumers. I often think of those scoping, cruel slavery days.

My people were an Southern sympathizers, but they saw their mistake after the war.

It is a pretty tough proposition my friend, to strip a human being, stand him on a block, sell him to the highest bidder and send him away from his wife and children, not for a day, a month, or a year but forever and forever. One of our greatest Americans said it must stop, and he stopped it but had an awful time and a bloody war before it was over.

I remember lots of war songs; this is one of them:

When this cruel war is over,
And the Lincoln boys dont band me,

I'll make my way straight back to the girl;

The girl I left behind me.

Oh that girl that pretty little girl,
The tears do fall and blind me

When I think of that pretty little girl;

The girl I left behind me.

I remember a couple of our neighbors went to town soon after the war and on their way home in the evening had to go through some timber country. They were riding along talking when, whiz wer' a bullet past their heads. They looked around and saw two or three men the brush and holloed at them and asked: What do you mean by shooting at us? The war is over. One of the bush-whackers holloed back and said: Its not over with me by heck and bang he went again. The neighbor got out of that like a coyote shot with a packsaddle.

That's the way it was after the war.
