**S. O. EMPLOYEES SAVE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS**

Standard Oil Company Add \$7,750,000 To \$15,750,000 Saved By Employees

Among 12,000 employees of the Standard Oil Company who owned 481,079 shares of the company stock, George C. Newell, manager of the Condon plant, and Jim Cresswell, last week went to Arlington to meet the sales manager of the company and to receive their stock certificates which they have acquired through the operation of the Company's Stock Investment plan.

Under this plan the employees may invest twenty per cent of salaries in stock and to each dollar so invested the company will add 50 cents.
