THRESHING OUTFITS

The 140,000 threshing outfits in the United States represent an investment of half a billion dollars. The average carrying charge on these outfits \$560 a year. Each of these outfits last year threshed \$13833 worth of small grain or a total of nearly two billion dollars worth of grain for all the outfits. The payroll for the men running these outfits, averaging three to a machine, is nearly fifty million dollars. The average outfit runs approximately three weeks in a year.

Minnesota tops the list of states in the total grain threshed with Iowa a close second. Where North Dakota farmers thresh on an average 3,224 bushel per farmer, Florida farmers thresh only three bushels per farmer.
