## SACK SEWING CONTEST

### PRIZES OFFERED BY HEPPNER RODEO COMMITTEE.

Heppner, Oregon, Sept. 1 1926  
-A Sack sewing contest, open to all comers, will take place at Heppner this fall according to R. W. Morse, Morrow County Agricultural Agent. This contest, which is being sponsored by the Morrow County Wool and Grain Show and the Heppner Rodeo Committee, will take place during the Rodeo, to be held September 23 24-25.

The preliminaries will be held on the morning of September 24, at which time each contestant will fill, sew, and pile five sacks. The finals will be held on the following morning, each contestant filling, sewing, and piling 10 sacks. Cash prizes of \$30, \$20, and \$10 will be given winners of the first three places.

The contest will be judged by a committee which will score each contestant on the time of sewing, workmanship, weight of sacks, and cleanliness, or the amount of grain spilled.
