## GOVERNMENT WINS POINT IN OIL FIGHT

Washington, D. C.—The government won another round in the long legal battle to bring to trial the defendants in the oil scandal, when the district court of appeals sustained a government motion to dismiss a special appeal which had been taken by attorneys for ex-Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, Harry F. Sinclair and Edward L. Doheny against the criminal indictments pending against them.

Unless attorneys for the indicted men now carry an appeal against the decision to the United States supreme court—which is probable—it means that Fall, Sinclair and Doheny will have to go to trial in criminal court here on the indictment.

The court's action was predicated on a new law, passed in the last congress at the instance of Senator Thomas J. Walsh (D) of Montana, who worked up the oil scandal. This law deprives the court of appeals of its power to grant special appeals in criminal cases. Attorneys for the indicted men had attacked this new law as a legislative invasion of judicial functions.

The decision covers all the indictments that are pending against the accused, including those charging Doheny and Fall with bribery and Sinclair with conspiracy.

There can be no appeal from the decision itself, except through the agency of applying to the United States supreme court for a writ of certiorari. This probably will be done, it was said by attorneys.

## BRIEF GENERAL NEWS

President Von Hindenburg of Germany celebrated his 75th birthday Saturday.

Marshal Joseph Pilsudski accepted the premiership of Poland, vacated by the resignation of Charles Bartel.

Alan Cobham, Britain's foremost civilian airman, has returned to London from a 28,000 mile round trip flight to Melbourne, Australia.

Arthur A. Hood, Minneapolis, was chosen grand snark of the universe to head the order of Hoo Hoo, a national organization of lumbermen.

On recommendation of President Calles the Mexican chamber of deputies has voted 1,000,000 pesos (\$500,000) for support of the military campaign against the rebel Yaqui Indians in the state of Sonora.

Arrangements have been completed by the emergency fleet corporation with American Legion officials for carrying legion members to the 1927 convention in Paris. The legion will travel aboard the United States liner Leviathan and other ships of that line.

Japanese authorities are determined to end the treaty forbidding pelagic sealing made in 1911 with United States, Great Britain and Russia to preserve seals in north Pacific waters when the time limit is reached, December 15, according to reports from Tokio.

## Navy to Build Air Bases in Northwest

Seattle, Wash.—Plans for development of three Pacific northwest aviation bases were announced here by Rear Admiral W. A. Moffett, chief of the naval bureau of aeronautics. With Sand Point, near Seattle, as headquarters, the navy intends to develop an auxiliary base at Port Angeles, Wash., he said, and to provide extensive facilities for housing dirigibles at Tacoma, Wash.

## Old Bill of Exchange

The oldest copy of a formal bill of exchange known to be in existence, at present, according to the periodical the Market for Exchange, is one dated at Milan on March 3, 1325, and runs in the original as follows:

"Pagate per questa prima lettera (lettera) di IX. Ottobre a Luca de Goro Lib. XLV. Sono per la valuta qui da Marco Reno, al tempo il pagate e ponete a mio conto e il che Christo el guardie Bonomeo de Bonomeo de Milano IX. de Marzo, 1325." Or, in English:

"Pay for this first bill of exchange, on the 9th day of October, to Luca Goro 45 livres; they are for value received here from Marco Reno; at the time of maturity pay the same to my account, thinking you, may Christ protect you, Bonomeo de Bonomeo of Milan, the 9th of March, 1325."
