## GAIN IN INMATES OF STATE INSTITUTIONS

Olympia, Wash.—Increase in number of inmates in the 23 state penitentiaries and charitable institutions for the six years from September 30, 1920, to September 30, 1926, was 1534, with a total of 7871 at the latter date, as shown by report compiled by the director of business control.

With the comparative figures given in two-year periods, the figures show: for September, 1922, 4856, shows an increase of \$19 over the 4837 inmate in 1920. Similarly, 1924, with 7331 shows an increase of 476 over 1922 and September, 1926, with 7871, shows an increase of 539 over 1924.

This institutional inmate population of 7871 September 30 last, shows an increase of 1534 or of 19.49 per cent over 1920; an increase of 1015 or of 12.90 per cent over 1922; and an increase of 539 or 6.85 per cent over 1924. This makes an average yearly increase of 255.66 or of 3.25 per cent.

The state penitentiary at Walla Walla had 587 prisoners in 1920 and 925 this year; the state training school at Chehalis grew from 222 to 307; the school for girls at Grand Mound from 115 to 150; while the state reformatory at Monroe increased from 395 to 555.

## "UNCLE JOE" CANNON DEAD

Veteran Lawmaker Passes Quietly With Family at His Bedside.

Danville, Ill. — In an ivy-covered church, where his wife planted the sprigs that in the years have grown into a massive bower of foliage, the final rites for "Uncle Joe" Cannon, were held Tuesday.

The veteran American lawmaker, who for 46 years was a member of the house of representatives, passed away at his home here at the age of 90.

Death came quietly, with members of his family by his bedside.

With him were his two daughters, Mrs. Ernest Le Seurs and Miss Helen Cannon.

The last few years of his life were spent in almost complete retirement. He walked a little, rode in automobiles as much as possible, wandered about his home town, conversing with old cronies and reminiscing of former days.

## Reardan, Wash., Bank Robbed.

Reardan, Wash.—Three masked robbers held up three employees and a customer of the Farmers' State bank and escaped with \$2500 in cash and about \$19,000 in liberty bonds. A man who at first refused to give his name was captured by two members of a posse within three hours of the robbery, and the money and \$2250 of the bonds were recovered.

## Cordova Shaken by Earthquake.

Cordova, Alaska.—An earthquake of unusual violence was felt here at 8:20 Sunday night. The tremor was accompanied by a distinct rumbling. Buildings shook and antennae masts of the United States naval radio station 14 miles from Cordova swayed a foot.

## INCOME TAX CREDITS PASSED TO CONGRESS

White House Indicates President Will Not Suggest Plan of Refund.

Washington, D. C.—Having disclosed that there is enough money in the treasury to warrant a 15 per cent credit on this year's income taxes, the administration feels that the next move is up to congress.

It was said at the White House that President Coolidge thought congress the best judge of what should be done with the surplus.

The pronouncement was taken as an indication that in his annual message, Coolidge probably would not attempt to work out details of the refund proposal, but would inform the senate and house they must fight out that question for themselves.

Secretary Mellon has suggested that the money returned to the taxpayers be remitted in the form of a credit on next year's payment, half of it to be deducted from the March installment and half from the June installment.

The 15 per cent minimum credit was predicated, Mr. Mellon explained, on a prospective surplus of \$300,000,000 for this fiscal year. First estimates made by the president indicated a surplus of \$200,000,000 and on that ground he proposed a 10 per cent credit which later was boosted to 12 1/2 per cent.

## THREATENING FACTS OUT

Grave Complications Likely to Arise From Investigation of Catalan Plot.

Paris.—Investigation of the activities of Ricciotti Garibaldi, kinsman of the Italian liberator, in connection with the plot of the Catalans to invade Spain from French territory is assuming a grave character because of its possible effect on Franco-Italian relations.

The investigators now maintain that Garibaldi's relations with Inspector General Lapolla of the Italian police department and with Lapolla's principal assistant, Inspector Scala, have been established beyond question. They are now bending their efforts to fathoming exactly what these relations have been.

Both Ricciotti and Sante Garibaldi, who also is a grandson of the Italian liberator, were examined by the police. Sante Garibaldi has an office in Paris, and it is asserted that Lapolla and Scala in the middle of October decided to send an agitator named Scivoli, employed in Sante Garibaldi's office, to Italy with a letter to anti-Fascist republicans in an endeavor to unite them in a huge gathering which would coincide with the Catalan separatist movement.

## Philippine Storm Takes Lives of 300.

Manila.—A typhoon, a tidal wave and a flood in widely separate areas have combined in a joint visitation of the Philippine Islands, leaving in their wake deaths believed in excess of 300 and heavy property damage.
