And you are hereby further notified that the plaintiff has caused a writ of attachment to be issued on the third day of November, 1926, in the above entitled action, and has caused the Sheriff of said County and State to attach the following described personal property, belonging to you, located in Morrow County, State of Oregon, to wit: \$372.32 attached and garnished in the hands of Ward Graves, of Ione, Morrow County, Oregon, and one spotted cow, dehorned.

PUBLIC HEALTH

More than 1,500,000 lives have been saved in the United States since 1906 by the campaign against tuberculosis of the lungs, according to a study recently completed and published by the National Tuberculosis Association. This is shown by the fact that in 1900 this disease caused about 169,500 deaths, or 185 deaths to every 100,000 people living in the country at that time. In 1924, when the U. S. population was more than 110,000,000, there were 85,500 deaths from this cause, or a rate of 78 deaths to every 100,000 people. Had the 1900 rate continued through the entire period to 1924, tuberculosis of the lungs would have caused one and a half millions more deaths than it did cause during this period. In the year 1924 alone, this drop in the death rate made a clear saving of 117,700 lives.
