MEANING OF DETENTION PERIOD

The "Detention Period" which was introduced into the high school program at the beginning of this year, is not what some may believe it to be, and to prevent any misunderstanding, we wish to give the parents of the community a clear idea of what it really is.

First of all when a student is not doing favorably in a subject he needs a chance to improve. The detention period affords him this opportunity as it gives him an additional period of study each day under the supervision of a teacher. If he takes advantage of it, he will soon be making an improvement. Eventually this improvement will be so perceptible that his name will not be on the list when it is read at the beginning of each week.

Another important point about Detention is that it persuades the student to work hard in his subjects, thus preventing his having to remain after school, for the hours from 3:15 to mealtime are highly valued by the student for recreation and relief from study.

The Detention Period has proved a valuable help in raising the standard of the high school this semester and may prove a satisfactory remedy for cases of spring fever later this year. At first being on the detention list was treated as a good joke by the students, but after a few weeks they realized that this period was meant for study instead of play. Keeping up their work satisfactorily proved more attractive than being on the Detention list; hence their subjects have been studied more diligently to avoid the necessity of the after school session.

In closing we wish to add that Detention is not a punishment. It is a privilege to be appreciated by the student, wherein he can bring his work up to the standard of his classmates. It indicates to him the type of work he is doing and what he is expected to do, thus preventing failures that might otherwise occur.
