Abbey Is Battle Pledge

Battle abbey, near Hastings, Eng-
land, was built to fulfill a novel
pledge made by William the Con-
queror just before his victory there on
October 14, 1066.

When William was arming for the
fight he is said to have inadvertently
put on his shirt of mail with the hind
side in front. Partly in order to avert
the bad omen, he vowed that, if vic-
torious, he would build on the very
site of the battle a great abbey.

It was finally dedicated by William
Rufus in 1094. At the dissolution of
the monasteries under Henry VIII, the
buildings were given to Sir Anthony
Browne, who added to the abbey's
glory a west wing for the use of his
ward, the Princess Elizabeth. The ab-
bey still is in excellent preservation.

Mental State Depends

Much on Environment

In order permanently to cure a child
of nervousness it is necessary to re-
move the underlying cause, not merely
to alleviate the distressing symptoms
declares Dr. Frank Howard Richard-
son in Hygeia Magazine. This will,
probably involve some change in the
environment, for it is recognized that
environmental influences affect a child
so much that they will greatly modify
any mental condition, no matter how
bad.

While this is encouraging, there will
be plenty of difficulty in many cases.
If a companion, a teacher, a brother
or a sister is at the bottom of the
nervous condition, the change may
easily be made. However, in many
cases the child's nervousness is really
due to a jealous or tyrannical father
or to a weak, pampering mother. It is
almost hopeless to alter the environ-
ment resulting from such parental dis-
turbances.

In all cases it is up to the parents
to provide the proper atmosphere and
environment for their children's de-
velopment. Otherwise no amount of
treatment by physician or psychiatrist
will be of any avail.

ORDINANCE No. 113

AN ORDINANCE granting to
the Sherman Electric Co., a cor-
poration, its successors and assigns
a franchise to construct, maintain
and operate in the present and fu-
ture streets, alleys and public places
of the City of Ione and its succes-
sors, electric light and power lines
and appurtenances thereto, for the
purpose of supplying electricity
and electric service to the City
of Ione, the inhabitants thereof and
others.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
COMMON COUNCIL OF THE
CITY OF IONE, OREGON:

Section 1. There is hereby grant-
ed to Sherman Electric Co., a corpora-
tion, and to its successors and as-
signs (hereinafter called the grantee)
the right, privilege and franchise for
the period of fifty (50) years, to con-
struct, maintain and operate in the
present and future streets, alleys and
public places in the City of Ione, and
its successors, electric light and pow-
er lines, with all necessary or desir-
able appurtenances, including under-
ground conduits, poles, wires and
telephone and telegraph wires for
their own use, for the purpose of
supplying electricity and electric ser-
vice to the said City of Ione, the in-
habitants thereof and persons and
corporations within and beyond the
limits thereof for light, power, heat
and other purposes.

Section 2. The height and loca-
tion of poles and fixtures and the
location of underground conduits
shall be subject to reasonable regu-
lation and control of such commit-
tee of the City as the City Council
may designate, or as may be desig-
nated by law; and all such poles and
fixtures shall be so erected as to in-
terfere as little as possible with traf-
fic or other public uses. All of said
electric lights and appurtenances shall
be installed and at all times main-
tained by the grantee in safe order
and condition and in accordance with
good engineering practice; and where
necessary for the protection of its
service to the public, the grantee
shall remove any branches of trees
which would impair the safe opera-
tion and maintenance of said lines.

Section 3. The service furnished
hereunder to said City and its inhab-
itants shall be a twenty-four hour
service, and shall be subject to such
reasonable rules and regulations as
the grantee may make from time to
time. The grantee may require reason-
able security for the payment of its
bills.

Section 4. When necessary to per-
mit any duly authorized person to
move any building or other struc-
ture across or along any street or al-
ley of the City of Ione, the grantee
shall raise or temporarily remove
its wires maintained hereunder upon
the request of the City Recorder, and
upon the cost to the grantee of so
doing being paid by the owner or
mover of such building.

Section 5. The City of Ione may,
without charge, therefore, attach its
fire alarm and police signal wires to
the poles of the grantee in said City,
but at its own risk and only in ac-
cordance with good electrical prac-
tice. Said wires shall be subject to
interference by the grantee only
when necessary in the maintenance,
operation and repair of its lines.

Section 6. The service to be fur-
nished hereunder by the grantee, its
successors and assigns, and all rates
and charges therefor, shall be sub-
ject at all times to any rules, regula-
tions and orders that may be law-
fully prescribed by the Public Service
Commission of Oregon, or by any
other authority or body having law-
ful jurisdiction over such matters.

Section 7. The grantee and its
successors and assigns shall hold
the City of Ione harmless from all ex-
pense or liability arising from any
negligent act or omission of the gran-
tee in the conduct of its operations
hereunder, and shall comply with
all reasonable by-laws and regulations
of the City of Ione relating to the
maintenance and improvement of the
streets and public places therein.

Section 8. This ordinance shall
be published for two consecutive times
in The Ione Independent, and shall
thereafter become null and void un-
less unconditional written accept-
ance hereof is filed by the grantee
herein with the City Recorder within
sixty (60) days from and after the last
publication hereof.
